If you have Macs and PCs that need to share files, DAVE is your solution. It's reliable, compatible with your existing software and user-friendly. DAVE provides separate installation programs for Mac OS X (10.1.5 and 10.2 Jaguar) and Mac OS 8 and 9; two products in one to protect your investment!

- Apple PowerPC Macintosh systems running Mac OS 8.6 or later
- Any hardware required to use TCP/IP
- CD ROM Drive

DAVE requires at least one of the following systems:

- Windows XP
- Windows 2000
- Windows NT Workstation or Server version 4.0 or later (service pack 6)
- Windows 95/98/Me
- Windows.net Server
- Other CIFS Compliant Servers (e.g., Samba)

CONFIGURE A WINDOWS PC

- 1. Verify your computer has the correct network hardware (network card, cables etc.).
- 2. Place the **DAVE CD** in the PC you would like to test to verify the following are installed and enabled:
 - Client for Microsoft Networks
 - TCP/IP
 - File and Print Sharing for Microsoft Networks

The **PC** Configuration Wizard should automatically test your settings. (If it doesn't, go to **Start / Run...** and browse for **Autorun.exe**.) If you have errors in your configuration, the wizard will display procedures to remedy the problem.

NOTE: For your Macintosh to see your PC on the network, the PC must be sharing at least one folder.

TIP: ON YOUR PC, RIGHT-CLICK ON THE NETWORK NEIGHBORHOOD OR MY NETWORK PLACES AND SELECT PROPERTIES TO VERIFY MOST NETWORK CONFIGURATIONS.

SHARE RESOURCES ON WINDOWS

See your Microsoft Windows documentation (Windows help system) if you are having difficulty configuring your Windows computer.

- 1. To share a resource (folder or printer) on your Windows PC, simply right-click on it and select **Sharing...** from the pop-up menu.
- 2. Click the **Shared As...** button and provide a share name. Select the desired access type for the shared folder. Once shared, the folder will appear with the shared folder icons.

Installer

Mac OS X Installer

INSTALL DAVE

IMPORTANT: TCP/IP should be configured on both your Mac and your PC before using the DAVE Setup Assistant. If you need help, see the TCP/IP Setup and Troubleshooting sections of this guide for more information.

FIRST: Before you install DAVE verify your PC is configured correctly (see previous sections).

- 1. Quit all other applications, insert the CD and double-click on the **DAVE Installer**. Also, Have your license code available to enter in the license field of the DAVE Setup Assistant.
- 2. The **DAVE Installer** will verify that your system has the required software and disk space available.
- 3. Choose an install option
- 4. **Restart** your Macintosh if prompted (in Mac OS X, you will not have to restart).
- 5. Complete the **DAVE Setup Assistant** (after you restart or after the installer guits, the DAVE Setup Assistant window will display).

DAVE SETUP ASSISTANT

After you install DAVE, the **DAVE Setup Assistant** will automatically open. The DAVE Setup Assistant will walk you through the Macintosh configuration and explain things you will need to know to setup DAVE. Make sure you have your DAVE license code and WINS IP addresses (if your IP address is automatically configured).

TIP: MOST CONFIGURATION ISSUES CAN BE REMEDIED BY RE-RUNNING THE **DAVE** SETUP ASSISTANT. SEE DAVE HELP (FINDER / HELP).

Browse and Mount



BROWSE AND MOUNT FOLDERS

NOTE: If Apple's SMB browse function is enabled, you may see duplicate shares in the Connect to Server window. To un-enable Apple's SMB, open Directory Access (Applications / Utilities) and un-enable SMB by deselecting the check box. DAVE browsing has changed in Mac OS X, the DAVE Network column heading does not display; all workgroups will display in the top-level column.

NOTE: When browsing DFS volumes, after you double-click on a DFS share it will display an empty folder. Close the window and double-click on the mounted DFS volume and the contents will display.

- 1. Select **Go / Connect to Server...** (or **Command+K**). The Connect to Server window will display. The browse window will display all available computers on the network.
- 2. Click on a computer name and then click **Connect** to display all of its shared folders. The list of shares for that server will display in a separate window. Depending on the access privileges for a share, you may need to enter a password (share-level access) or be logged into the network (user-level access).

NOTE: If you are attempting to access a server that requires a clear text password (such as certain SAMBA configurations), a drop-down sheet will display the following: WARNING: This server requires that your password be sent over the network in clear text. Continuing may leave your system vulnerable. To stop this warning from displaying every time you access the server, click the Check here to stop this warning from displaying check box.

NOTE: The **At:** drop-down menu caches recently accessed servers in the **Connect to Server** window. Also, you can enter an address manually in the **Address:** field.


USING A PC NETWORK PRINTER

- 1. Select Applications / Utilities and Print Center. The Print Center will display.
- 2. Click Add Printer...
- 3. From the top most drop-down sheet, select **DAVE Printing** from the list.
- 4. Browse for the desired printer. You can add a printer manually by entering its address in the **Printer's Address:** field at the bottom of the **DAVE Printing** window.

NOTE: If a printer name is longer than 12 characters it may not display in the **Print Center**. Enter the name manually or rename it and try sharing and accessing it again.

- 5. Select the printer model from the **Printer Model** drop-down list (**Generic** is the default) then select the model name.
- 6. Click Add. The selected printer will be added to the list of available printers in the Printer List field.

Browse and Mount



BROWSE AND MOUNT FOLDERS

Browse your network looking for files and folders with **DAVE**. Browsing is very similar to using the **Network Neighborhood** on Windows PCs.

NOTE: You can also browse using DAVE Client in the Chooser.

To browse for computers sharing files using **DAVE**:

- 1. Select **Apple menu** / **DAVE**. The computer names display in the **DAVE** application browse window.
- 2. Double-click on a computer name to see its shared folders. When you click on a computer name, a dialog appears that lists all the folders being shared by that computer. You may also see shared printers.
- 3. To mount a shared folder on your desktop, select the folder name then select **Mount Selection** from the **File** menu (or **Command+M**).

NOTE: A volume will automatically mount when you double-click on a file (the file will also be opened).



MOUNT A SHARED FOLDER MANUALLY

If the desired server does not display in the **Select a Server** dialog or the server you wish to mount is not listed, you can mount a server manually:

To mount a share manually using **DAVE**:

- 1. Select Apple menu / DAVE / Access / Mount Manually... The Mount Manually window displays.
- 2. Enter the **Server** and **Share** name of the volume (shared folder or resource) you wish to mount.
- 3. Select either the **NetBIOS** or **IP or DNS** name radio buttons.
- 4. Click OK.


NOTE: You can also browse using DAVE Client in the Chooser.

USING A PC NETWORK POSTSCRIPT PRINTER

After browsing the available computers using **DAVE Client** in the **Chooser**, you can create a desktop printer on your Macintosh from a shared printer. DAVE for OS 8 and 9 only supports PostScript printers.

- 1. Select Apple menu / Chooser / DAVE Client. DAVE Client will display all available shares.
- 2. Browse for and double-click the desired server or computer. The **Select Share** window displays.
- 3. Double-click the desired printer. The Create desktop Printer window displays.
- 4. Select **Allow Binary Printing** (optional sending binary data may cause errors for some PC printers) and click **Continue.** The printer will display on your desktop. The printer is now ready to use.

Share-level security



SHARE FOLDERS WITH SHARE-LEVEL SECURITY

- 1. Click on the **Start** button on the **DAVE Sharing** preferences window (**Apple menu** / **System Preferences...**) to start sharing resources.
- 2. Select the **Share Level** button to begin sharing with share-level security.
- 3. Click on the **Add Share** button to add a folder to your list of shared resources (or drag the desired folder onto the **DAVE Sharing** preference window). The **Share Level** access drop-down will display. Select the desired password mode (or both) from the dialog that displays:
 - Read Only Assign one password that grants read-only access.
 - Read/Write Assign one password that grants read-write access.
- 4. Select an access type from the **Access as** list. The default is the local user name currently logged into the computer.
- 5. Once you have created the access list, you can click **OK** and your folder will be available for sharing when **DAVE Sharing** is turned on.
- To remove or edit a share, select it then click Edit or Remove Share.

SHARE FOLDERS WITH LOCAL-LEVEL SECURITY

1. Select **Apple** menu / **System Preferences...** and select Apple's **Accounts** preference to setup local user access accounts (in Mac OS 10.2) or setup local users in **DAVE Sharing** (Mac OS 10.1.5).


NOTE: Make sure to select the Allow Windows users to log into this computer radio button.

- 2. Select the **DAVE Sharing** preferences (**Apple** menu / **System Preferences...**) to start sharing resources .
- 3. Select the **Local Level** radio button to begin sharing with local-level security.
- 4. Click on the **Add Share** button to add a resource to your list of shared resources. Or you can drag a resource to the shared resources window.

NOTE: You must manually turn **DAVE Sharing** on and off.

- 5. Click **Setup Local Users** to make the desired local users active then click **Done**.
- 6. Click **Add...** to add local users. To remove or edit a share, select it then click **Edit** or **Don't Share**.

Local-level security



User-level security



SHARE FOLDERS WITH USER-LEVEL SECURITY

User-level security utilizes the network user name and password to allow access to your shared resource.

NOTE: You cannot use user-level security unless your network includes an NT, XP, 2000 or a Windows.net domain server.

To share a resource on your Macintosh with others on your network:

- 1. Click on the Start button on the **DAVE Sharing** preferences window (**Apple** menu / **System Preferences...**) to start sharing resources.
- 2. Select the **User Level** radio button to begin sharing with user-level security. The **Domain** window will display.
- 3. Enter your home domain. If you don't know your domain name, contact your IT administrator.
- 4. Click on the **New Share** button to add a resource to your list of shared resources (or drag the desired resource onto the **DAVE Sharing** preference window).
- 5. Choose a resource, then click **Open** to share it.
- 6. If you are not logged onto the network, you will need to provide credentials to your domain controller so you can get a list of users and

groups that are members of your domain. Enter your user name and password for your domain, and click OK.

- 7. To allow users access to your shared resources, Click the Set Up User Aliases... button and complete the following
 - In the **PC Users and Groups** field, select the users you would like to share with. If you want to allow everyone access, select Everyone.
 - After making selections, click Add. The alias displays in the User Alias field.
 - If you want to add specific users by name, select Add Manually and enter their user name and domain.
 - (Optional) When you have added the desired aliases, you can change their local account determination by clicking their **Local User** name and selecting an account determination from the drop-down list. Click **Done**.

NOTE: If there is a yield sign next to a user's listing, they do not have privileges to the folder you are sharing.

- 8. Select Add... The Add User Alias window displays.
- 9. Select the desired user alias and click Add. The user alias will be added to the Share this folder with these users: field.
- 10. Click Save.

SHARE MACINTOSH PRINTERS WITH YOUR PC NETWORK

You may share any printer that is configured in the Mac OS X **Print Center** with your PC Network. Be sure you have the Windows driver software for your printer. Most printers come with driver software for all Mac and PC operating systems.

- 1. Click on the **Start** button on the **DAVE Sharing** preferences window (**Apple menu / System Preferences...**) to start sharing resources.
- 2. Select either **Share Level**, **Local Level** or **User Level** access button (see previous sections for information on each).
- 3. Select the **Printers** tab and click on the **Add Printer** button to add a printer to your list of shared resources. A dialog will display based on your access type; enter the desired access privilege information.
- 4. Click Edit Printer or Remove Printer (with the desired printer selected) to edit or delete a share from the list.
- 5. Click **Info** (with the desired printer selected) to remove print jobs from the print gueue and to view printer information.
- 6. Select Choose Spool Folder... to select the folder that your print jobs will reside.
- 7. Click **DONE** when finished. The printer will now be available on your PC network.
- 8. On your PC, browse for the shared printer in the **Network Neighborhood** (or **My Network Places**) and double-click on the printer. Follow the directions that display in the printer setup wizard.



Share-level security



SHARE FOLDERS/PRINTERS WITH SHARE-LEVEL SECURITY

DAVE for Mac OS 8 and 9 lets you share your files and PostScript printers with other CIFS networking clients such as Windows and other Macintosh systems running DAVE. With DAVE, Microsoft clients will see DAVE resources in their **Network Neighborhood** and Macintosh computers will see DAVE resources in the **Chooser**.

WARNING: Shutting down DAVE Sharing without properly notifying attached users to save their work and disconnect may result in data loss. If no users are connected to your Macintosh a warning will not be issued.

NOTE: You must manually turn **DAVE Sharing** on (or off). Just adding a shared item will not cause DAVE Sharing to become active.

If you have a Windows NT domain available on your network and want to use it for access control, you should read **Share Folders/Printers with User-Level Security**.

To share a resource on your Macintosh with others on your network:

- 1. Select Apple menu and DAVE. The DAVE application will display.
- 2. Select **File** and **File Sharing...** The **DAVE Sharing** window will display.

Sharing with Your PC Network


- 3. In the Sharing Options field, click Change... and select Password Protect Each Share (Share Level) and click OK.
- 4. Click **NEW Share** and browse for the desired resource and click **Choose** or drag and drop an item onto the list of shared resources. The **Sharing Passwords** window will display.
- 5. Change the shared resource name (optional).

NOTE: Entering a new name in this field will not change the original name of the share.

- 6. Select one or both of the following access levels:
 - Read Only Assign one password that grants read-only access.
 - Read/Write Assign one password that grants read-write access.
- 7. Select either **Optimize for File Sharing** (users accessing your resources have priority) or **Optimize for User Applications** (local computer runs applications faster).
- 8. Click the **Log Sharing Activity** check box. When using logging, **DAVE Sharing** will create a log file of the users accessing your shared resources in your System Folder. You can view this file with SimpleText or any other application that can open a text file.
- 9. Click **Start** at the bottom of the window. Your Macintosh will display in the **Network Neighborhood** (or **My Network Places**) under the workgroup you designated in the **NetBIOS** control panel. Once DAVE Sharing is started, users can access your resources you have shared.
- 10. Close the **DAVE Sharing** window.



User-level security



SHARE FOLDERS/PRINTERS WITH USER-LEVEL SECURITY

You can use user-level access control if your network has at least one Windows NT domain. Windows NT domains provide security services needed by computers on your network. If you do not have a Windows NT domain available on your network, see **Share Folders/Printers with Share-Level Security**, since user level control only works with Windows NT domains.

- 1. Select Apple menu and DAVE. The DAVE application will display.
- 2. Select **File** and **File Sharing...** The **DAVE Sharing** window will display.
- 3. In the **Sharing Options** field, click **Change...** and click the **Use Windows Domain Security (User Level)** radio button, complete the **Get Domain Security Info From:** field (the name of the domain used to authorize access to shared folders) and click **OK**.
- 4. Click **New Share** and browse for the desired resource and click **Choose** or drag and drop an item onto the list of shared resources. The **Configuring Share** window displays.
- 5. Select the users, groups (or **Everyone**) that you want to share your resources with by dragging them to the **Access is allowed for these users and groups:** box.

Sharing with Your PC Network

- 6. If you are not logged onto the network, you will need to provide credentials to your domain controller so you can get a list of users and groups that are members of your domain. Enter your user name and password for your domain, and click **OK**.
- 7. Select a user or group from the list and select **Sharing** (from the **DAVE** menu) or **Control** + **click** to change the access level:
 - · Read Only grants read-only access.
 - Read/Write grants read and write access.
- 8. Change the shared resources name (optional) and click **OK**.

NOTE: Entering a new name in this field will not change the original name of the share.

- 9. Select Sharing / Add Manually... or Control + click to add a user or group manually (optional).
- 10. To remove a user or group select the desired listing and **Control + click**. Then select **Clear** from the drop-down menu (or you can select the user and click delete). When you have finished adding the desired users and groups click **OK**.
- 11. Select either **Optimize for File Sharing** (users accessing your files have priority) or **Optimize for User Applications** (local computer runs applications faster).
- 12. Click the **Log Sharing Activity** check box (optional). When using logging, **DAVE Sharing** will create a log file of the users accessing your shared resources in your **System Folder**. You can view this file with a document reader like SimpleText.
- 13. Click **Start** at the bottom of the **DAVE Sharing** window. Your Macintosh will display in the **Network Neighborhood** (or **My Network Places**) under the workgroup you designated in the **NetBIOS** control panel. Once **DAVE Sharing** is started, users can access your shared resources.
- 14. Close the **DAVE Sharing** window.

TCP/IP Setup and Troubleshooting



TCP/IP SETUP

If you already have TCP/IP on your network, you'll need to contact your network administrator for any information necessary to configure your computer. If you have a simple network that doesn't already use TCP/IP, use the following information.

NOTE: Misconfiguring TCP/IP could interrupt other users on your network.

If you are new to TCP/IP, you'll need a TCP/IP address and subnet mask for each computer you want to configure. Our suggestion is to use the following addresses:

Computer 1:

TCP/IP address: 192.168.0.1 Subnet Mask: 255.255.255.0

Computer 2:

TCP/IP address: 192.168.0.2 Subnet Mask: 255.255.255.0

NOTE: The last number in the address is incremented for each computer. This set of addresses range from 192.168.0.1 to 192.168.0.254. The subnet mask is the same for every computer in this address range.

- TCP on the Macintosh
- TCP on the PC
